Someone long ago, with a good deal more time on their hands than me, came up with symbolism and meaning for many flowers. Here are just a few that we have in the Pond Home landscaping this time of year:

- ~ **DAFFODILS** –symbolize new beginnings, rebirth, hope, and optimism.
- \sim **TULIPS** symbolize perfect love, elegance, grace, beauty, happy memories, & cheerful thoughts
- ~ **HYACINTHS** symbolize a desire for forgiveness, joy, sincerity, and jealousy (just when I thought none of these meanings would be negative)!
- ~ LILY OF THE VALLEY symbolize purity, joy, love, sincerity, happiness, and luck.
- ~ **LILACS** this flower seems to have many meanings depending on the color of the flower. White means purity and innocence, violet symbolizes spirituality, and lilac-colored lilacs symbolize a first love.

May it be a merry month for you. Hope to see you outside smelling the many flowers we have around the landscape.

Resident Spotlight



This month's resident spotlight is none other than **Beverly Leete**. Beverly is an amazing woman who possesses both resilience and a magnanimous heart. She has handled critical life challenges with grace and aplomb.

She reports that she was "raised very in a strict environment" adding that "If it was fun, we couldn't do it". Since her Father was the minister of the "chores, Church, Nazarene church, and chores" more the occupied years of her childhood. However, she reports that one of the highlights of having a minister as a father was

that they often had dinner guests who were missionaries from foreign countries like Africa.

Beverly married and raised her children in New England where her generosity and giving nature served to improve the lives of those less fortunate. She raised three biological daughters who all live locally. She has an adopted son who has special needs and lives successfully in New Hampshire. She happily remembers taking him directly from the hospital after his biological mother abandoned him.

Beverly continued to extend her generosity as a foster parent. Amanda was her first foster child. And although she wanted to adopt her, Amanda was adopted by another family when she was 1 ½ years old. Beverly reports that this experience was "heartbreaking".

Matthew and Mark, brothers, followed as foster children when they were 3 and 4 years old. They lived with Beverly and her family for 2 years. Always mindful of the needs of others, she ensured the bond with their two biological sisters was not broken through frequent visits. She describes their reunification with their biological parents and 2 sisters as a joyful event.

Another foster child needed to be placed for only three months. She took him in when he was 5 or 6. She laughs remembering him rolling in her grass. The social worker explained that he had never before played in grass.

Amid her busy life, her husband became disabled with a bone disease in his twenties. So, out of necessity, Beverly began working for a company that built modular homes. A job as a Software Engineer became available if she could pass a computer test. She did pass, and it was the beginning of a twenty-five-year career.

Beverly divorced her first husband and later married Jim in 1999. Unfortunately, 2 years after their marriage, they were in a "terrible car accident". Jim injured his back and was wheelchair bound. She semi-retired to take care of him. However, eventually she had to fully retire. Despite the challenges they faced, Beverly reports they travelled all over the US, Mexico and Canada in a motor home. Her travels with Jim created her fondest memories. "It was a wonderful life."

Beverly is most proud of her children. Her three daughters all work in the health field and her son is living happily in New Hampshire. She has 5 grandchildren and 4 great grandchildren.

She loves gardening, crocheting and sewing.

Beverly lived at Pond Meadow for 12 years before moving to Pond Home in March 2024. She loves Pond Home adding, "I've never been so pampered". She loves the Bubble Baths! Beverly deserves to be pampered!

It is not your job or responsibility to get me back in, but I do appreciate you alerting someone to my whereabouts. I would never want to miss a snack or meal because I am outside!










DEBBIE'S WISDOM
